M: Oh, I don't know. When I was small, I had clarinet lessons and the oboe. I liked the clarinet better, so I wanted to play a clarinet. That's where it started. I started on the clarinet. R: What do you think is the role of an artist in society?

M: Bringing music to the people. Bringing happiness. Creative music. Sound. Deal with melodies. Sound. Better world. Create a better world, no matter how small.

R: Yeah!

Of all the instruments you've played, and I know that you've played quite a few, what's your favorite instrument to

M: Well, I got Saxophone, flute, oboe, piccolo, EVI, and finger piano. I like em all. My main instrument is an alto saxophone.



R: When did you start to incorporate electronic instruments into your playing? M: When I ran into Sun Ra. When I joined the Sun Ra Arkestra.

R: Right away? Or did it take a while? M: No, it took a little while until I got familiar with them. I joined the Arkestra, and he was talking about electronic things.

R: Already?

M: Yeah, yeah.

R: He was kind of ahead of the curve on a lot of things.

M: Right.

R: Was your and Sun Ra's decision to incorporate synthesizers and electronic instruments-

M: That's what he was telling us! The future is going to be electronic trumpets, drums, and everything so get yourself together. You gonna have the electronic duplicate the natural things.

R: Did he- so, it wasn't just about how it sounded. He also like that it was-M: He had a vision of what his music was

about so all he needed was to train the musicians to project the music.

R: You can give him his-

M: That's Cornelia.

R: Is that drink for him?

R: What motivated you to work with Sun Ra over other band leaders?

M: I tell you. I was in Paris. I was over there in Europe 7 or 8 years. So, when I came home, I was looking for a band to join. So, I did jam sessions around and

around and around. A guy told me about, "here's a demo with Sun Ra on it."

R: Yeah!

M: I was buying his records all the time, you know, hey! Ok! I took it home and I heard Super Blonde and I said, "Damn that's a nice band!" R: Hahaha.

M: I had a friend who asked me where do you live, and I said on the South side. He said well that's where Sun Ra is, on the south side. So, you know he said you're right around, you live 6 blocks from him!

R: Haha.

M: So, I went one day while the band was rehearsing. I walked in and that was the beginning.

R: Yeah!

M: He was talking about outer space and all that stuff. Talking about the Bible and outer space, Earth, and all this stuff. Electronic instruments. Talking about what you should prepare yourself for. He was talking about all of that before it happened.

R: Was Sun Ra a prophet? M: You can call him what you want. A prophet or something, whatever. But, I know he was a master musician.

R: Yeah.

M: And, he had a bright mind. And a vision. And a program.

R: Yeah.

M: That's all it is. I have to be part of that program to be successful. R: Does it feel to you like you inherited more than a band? M: It is more than a band. I did. I learned my lessons the best I could. When everything passed away and they went through all the planets I had nothing left. So, what am I supposed to do with all these things that he was building all these years? I had to carry on with it the best of my knowledge. Carry on with his wonderful musical genius. R: So, do you feel sometimes like someone or something else is playing through you when you
